



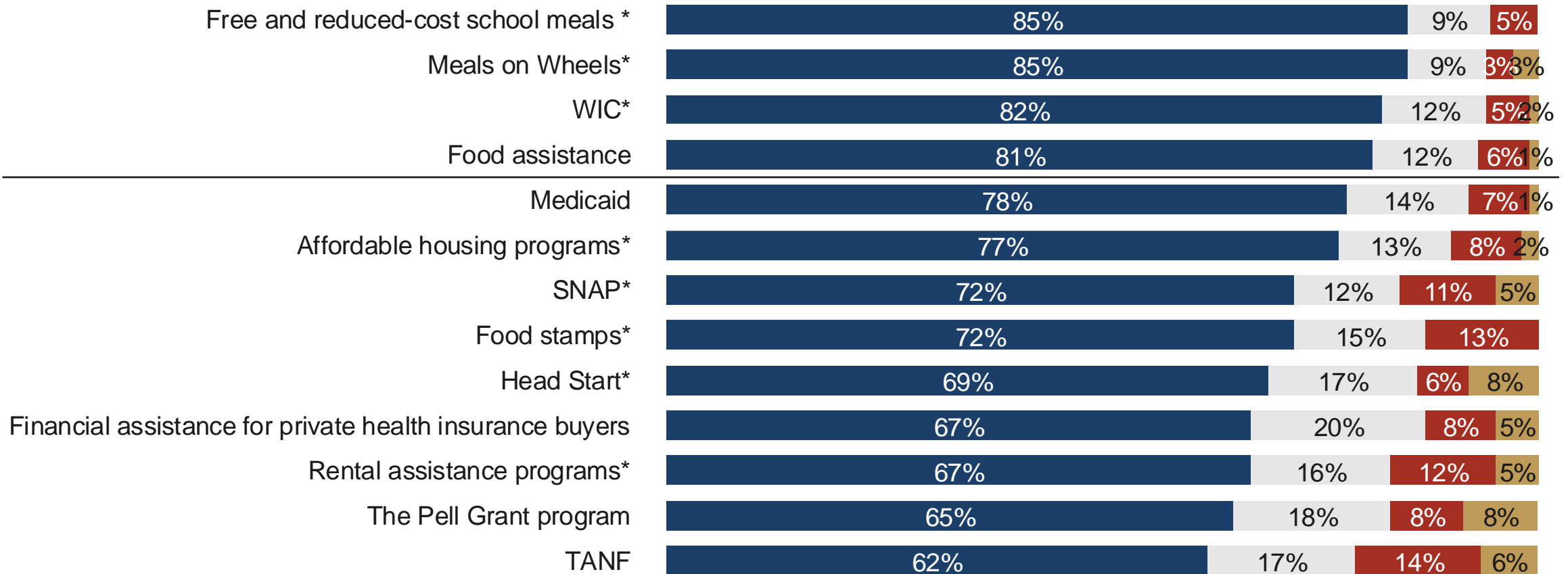
The Missing Link in Reconciliation Messaging: Meeting Americans Basic Needs

Rating of feelings

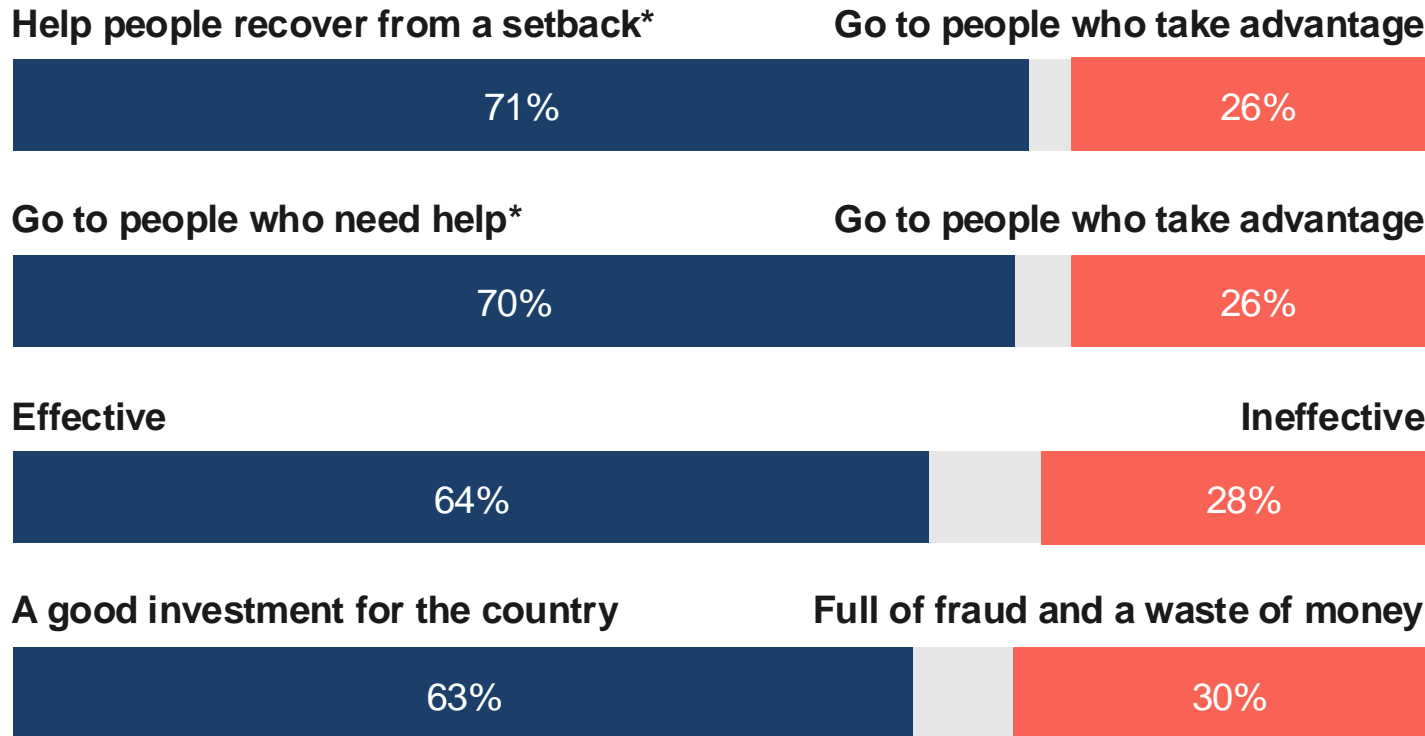
■ Favorable ■ Neutral ■ Unfavorable ■ Not familiar

Which phrase better describes these programs?

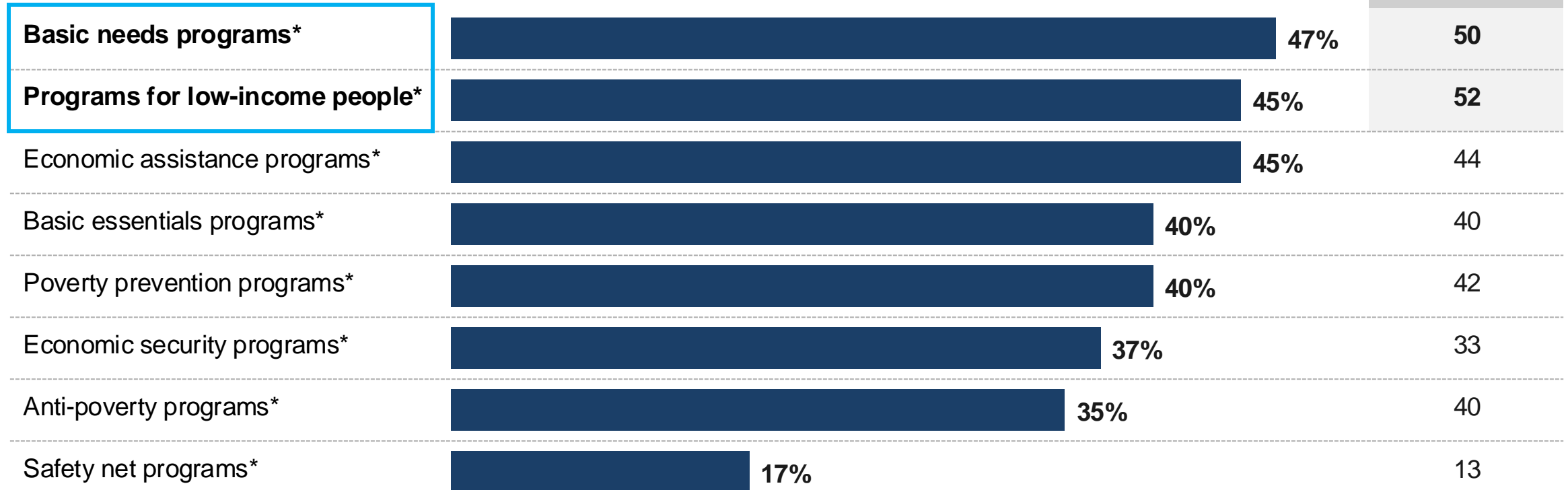

Voters strongly oppose the Administration's budget bill.

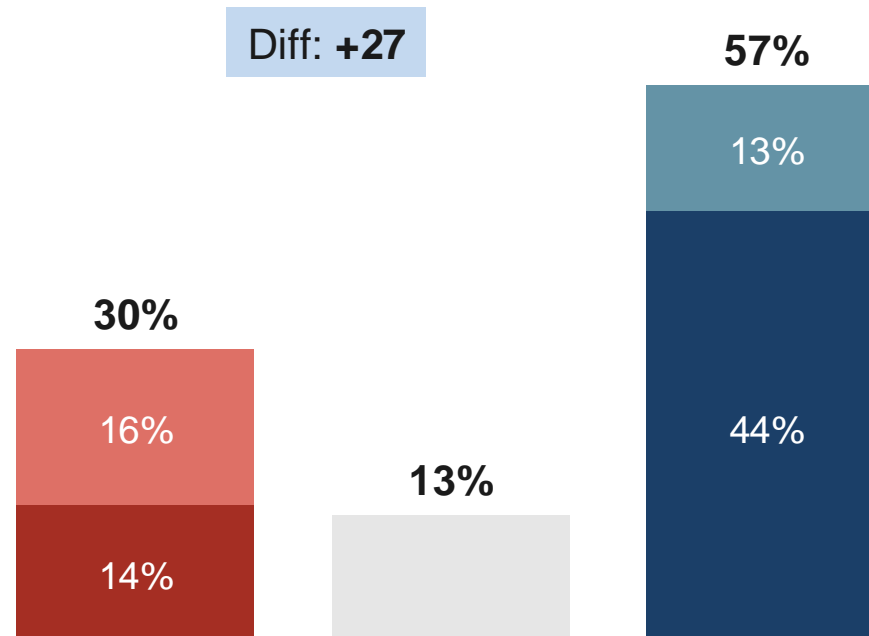
Description prior to question:

The most important attacks to guard against focus on fraud and abuse – not the threat of a large tax increase.

This is a VERY (8-10) convincing reason to support the budget bill:

The federal government is wasting American taxpayers' money by allowing massive fraud and abuse. It's time to stop handing out blank checks and put Americans first. Assistance should go to those in need--not people who are able to work but don't.*

Stronger with white non-college women (55%) and low-income whites (53%), also strong with non-liberal Democrats (42%).

**Weakest Message:
Tax Increase**

Congress must pass the Trump Agenda to secure the border, strengthen national security, and boost American-made energy. Failure to pass this budget bill will automatically trigger the largest tax increase in American history, raising taxes on the average family by nearly \$2,000 a year to fund government waste.

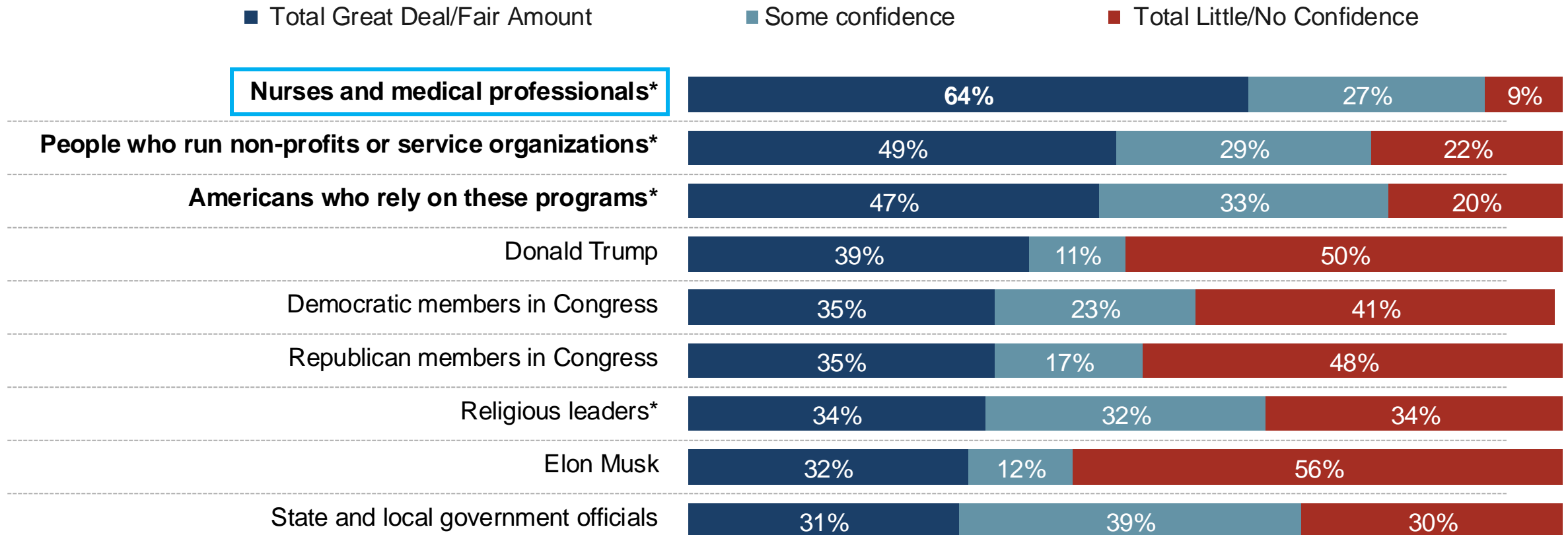
Weaker with Independents (17%) and non-liberal Democrats (20%), only average with white non-college women (36%).

Strongest messages against the budget show you demand change, and contrasts against a cruel plan that harms Americans to benefit the wealthy.

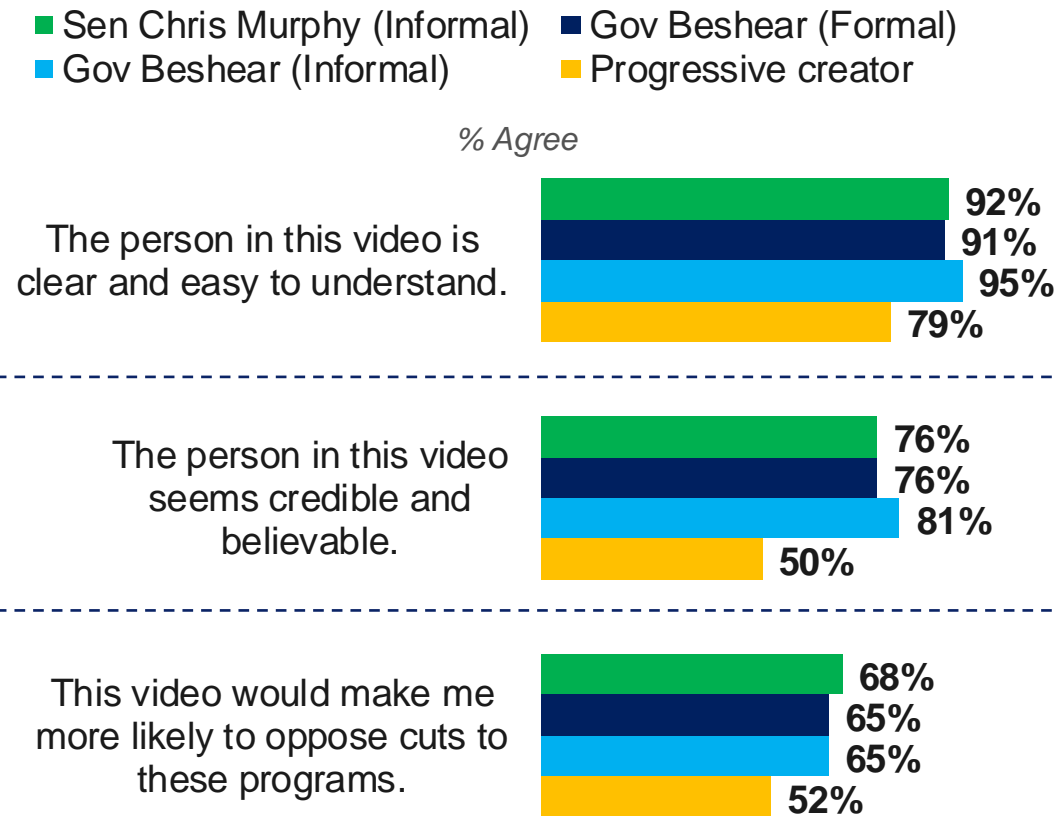

The informal videos from Senator Murphy and Governor Beshear performed the best. An informal format increased credibility especially with typically less engaged people.

Key Messaging Takeaways

1. **One story on costs:** Place this in the context of unaffordable prices, to help Americans identify with the challenges facing those in need and see themselves as part of the story. With tariffs, economic uncertainty, cuts to food banks and rising grocery bills, officials who fight for their constituents' basic needs will be on a strong foundation.
2. **Basic needs:** All these services help Americans meet basic needs, such as **food** and **healthcare** which had strong support. These services are essential – there is nothing extravagant about them.
3. **Demand better:** Americans want these programs to work, and taxing the wealthy is a much better way to address any budget problems than cutting off vulnerable people from basic needs.
4. **Fraud:** Opponents' strongest argument is that they are only targeting fraud and abuse – supporters should contest fraud and emphasize they are cutting the heart out of these programs, not the fat. This isn't an argument won on whether fraud exists or not, the supporters of the budget are already decimating the core of these programs.
5. **Children:** Focus on how these programs help children and disabled people. Americans understand that cutting services to needy children will impose long-term costs on the country.
6. **Informal Content:** Vertical video and other informal content is especially effective at connecting with lower-income and non-college Americans. These groups are less set in their views on issues.
